



The 2A State Golf Tournament was held at the Conway Country Club October 2-3. The St. Joseph boys team finished 2nd to Buffalo Island Central with a 274 to 255.

We had two players make All-State, with Timmy Coney shooting an 87 and finishing 6th overall. Gus Longing shot a 91 and came in 9th overall.

Coach Jessie Ross was asked if she could have predicted the team would do this well? "No, with what I had this year it was a very good learning season," she said. "I think it will help us for the upcoming years." As to the future, Coach Ross said, "I feel that the team will strive to improve and to do better than they did this year. Deer Season

Zone 8 (Faulkner & Conway Counties)
2017-18 Deer Season Dates

- Archery:** Sept. 23-Feb. 28
- Private Land Antlerless Only Modern Gun Deer Hunt:** Oct. 14-18
- Muzzleloader:** Oct. 21-29 and Dec. 9-11
- Special Youth Modern Gun Deer Hunt:** Nov. 4-5 and Jan. 6-7
- Modern Gun:** Nov. 11-Dec. 3 and Dec. 26-28
- Statewide Bag Limit:**

Six deer, of which no more than two may be bucks. The statewide seasonal bag limit may be taken in any combination of zones or methods, as long as zone bag limits are not exceeded.

No dogs allowed for deer hunting in Deer Zone 1. Button bucks count as antlerless deer. No antler-point restrictions on harvest.

In Madison and Carroll counties the following CWD regulations apply: Feeding of wildlife prohibited except legal baiting on private land for hunting allowed Sept. 1-Dec. 31. Food plots are allowed year-round.

Coach Luke Davis' 8th grade Earth Science class recently did a project on the layers of the Earth's atmosphere. The four main layers of the atmosphere are the stratosphere, mesosphere, thermosphere and exosphere.

The students were split up into groups and were assigned to make a model of any kind describing the layers of the atmosphere. Each group made a very unique and different model. One group even made their model into a cake with different layers to show the atmosphere's layers.






Alli's Review:
