(also known as the Holy Ghost Fathers) who established our church and school in 1879.

When the building opened, it only served students in the first through eighth grades. A new grade was added each year thereafter so by 1930 the school reached the 12th grade.
When a new high school was built in 1951, Spiritan Hall continued to serve students in the lower grades. It ceased to function as a classroom building after the 2001-2002 school year. It remained opened for meetings and theatrical productions until its closure in December.
The PAO was built in 1966 and was the church rectory and business office until a separate priests' home was constructed in the early 2000s.
