Carrots, lettuce, bell peppers, tomatoes, and jalapenos were planted under the guidance of their teachers and Faulkner County Extension Service representative Kami Green. She visits the classes each month to educate the children about gardening. This often includes making healthy smoothies to taste test the vegetables that have been planted or brought in from other gardens. That will probably be done with their lettuce crop before the school year ends since it will likely be the only vegetable to sprout by then.

It has received \$250 from the Farm Bureau each year since then to maintain the project. Educational help also came from the Extension Service and Conway's Master Gardeners. Some gardening tools and supplies have also been donated by local businesses.



Students Receive Scapulars By Staton Holbrook





AC, DC

Class Learns How Electricity Works



Mr. Bill Gooch explains the types of electrical current and circuits to 4th grade students.

Last month, Mr. Bill Gooch, a retired electrical engineer and father-in-law to 4th grade teacher Ms. Nicole Gooch, came to her class to talk about electricity. Mr. Gooch explained the differences between alternating (AC) and direct current (DC) and parallel and series circuits. In DC, the electric charge (current) only flows in one direction. The electric charge in AC changes direction periodically. Since high voltages are more efficient for sending electricity great distances, AC electricity has an advantage over DC. This is because the high voltages from the power station can easily be reduced to a safer voltage for use in people's homes. DC power is widely used in low voltage applications such as charging batteries, automotive applications, aircraft applications, and other low voltage low current applications.

In talking about parallel and series circuits, Mr. Gooch noted that a parallel circuit provides more than one possible path for current to follow. A series circuit provides only one possible path for current to flow. For example, the light bulbs in your home are on a parallel circuit. If one goes out the others stay on. A set of Christmas tree lights is on a series circuit. When one light goes out, the others go out with it.
