## Art Promotes International Understanding by Lauren Holbrook



The St. Joseph Interact Club and Ms. Christen Reyes' Spanish classes recently collaborated on a project to promote international understanding. The Conway Rotary Club, which sponsors Interact, requires Interact to conduct such a project each year. This was the first time the club approached Ms. Reyes about it. She then devised her own idea for the collaboration.
"The students worked to create a 'mural' representing themes in Mexican-American art and literature," Ms. Reyes said. "In class, they learned about the different ideas regarding Mexican-American and Chicano identity and Mexican-American history." Through viewing different murals painted throughout the United States, as well as the history of how these murals began, they focused on various cultural themes specific to this art form. Some of these themes included love of family, promoting faith, balancing two cultures, pride in indigenous heritage, support for their community, and appreciation of laborers. The students then read the poem "Children of Fieldworkers" by Cynthia Ozuna that shared these themes in literary form. After reading the poem, the class broke into groups to illustrate stanzas of the poem while also tying in other ideas fundamental to Chicano Muralism. Once the students finished creating their posters, they were put together to create their own 'mini-mural'.

Seven St. Joseph 8th grade girls attended the Girl Power in STEM Conference at UCA on April 26. They were escorted by Counselor Kristen Piraino.
The conference was an opportunity for them to gain hands-on experience and learn about careers related to science, technology, engineering, and math. They interacted with female professionals and current UCA students to develop a greater understanding of their own potential and power.
The girls were encouraged to pursue academic excellence in their high school and college years and were provided a "college day" experience. Girl Power in STEM aims to empower girls at a time in their life when they tend to lose interest in science. "Eighth grade is a pivotal age, when girls internalize negative stereotypes that discourage academic achievement and face increased peer expectations and social pressures," a conference document stated.
Retired professional engineer Ms. Raye J. Montague, who worked in U.S. Navy ship design, was the group's guest speaker.
